### Course Description:

This course focuses on classics of Ancient Greek Rhetoric. We will begin by reading Aristotle's *Rhetoric* (in translation). We will read the following speeches in the original Greek, focusing on advanced Greek grammar and syntax as well as literary style, along with trends in Greek intellectual history:

Gorgias: "Encomium of Helen"

Isocrates: "Against the Sophists"

Lysias: "On the Killing of Eratosthenes"

Antiphon: "Prosecution for Accidental Homicide"

Thucydides: The Peloponnesian War, Bk. I & II (excerpts)

Demosthenes: "Third Philippic"

The course will also involve translation projects that use the principles we observe in the reading.

Course Objectives & Student Learning Objectives: This course has four primary goals. Student will:

- 1. Build their Greek vocabulary
- 2. Continue building their mastery of Greek grammar and syntax
- 3. Expand their awareness of topics in Greek literature and prose style
- 4. Expand their awareness of issues in translation as a genre of writing

**Transformational Learning Outcomes:** The University of Central Oklahoma is a learning-centered organization committed to Transformative education through active engagement in the teaching-learning interchange, scholarly and creative pursuits, leadership, global competency, healthy lifestyles, and service to others. ### Assignments

### Reading

The main work of this class is reading through excerpts of Greek texts (with supplementary commentaries as necessary). Each selection is reasonably short, but we will cover a number of authors who vary greatly in style and in difficulty.

## Meetings

This class will be run as a tutorial, which means that individual student preparation and discussion is very important. It is the student's responsibility to lead the bulk of conversation in each meeting.

#### Translations

Most of the grade will be determined by 3 large translation assignments. These will have two components: (a) a translation of an extended passage of Greek that aims to balance fidelity to the original text with accessible English, and (b) a reflection essay on specific challenges or choices made in this translation.

#### Grades

There are three components to the grade for this course:

Participation: 10%

Translations: 90% (3 x 30%)

Participation means both regularly attending scheduled discussion sessions *and* being prepared to take the lead on a lengthy, in-depth conversation about the day's material. This course will run more as a tutorial than a lecture, so it is the student's responsibility to make discussion sessions worthwhile.

#### Academic Honesty

Given that much of this course is devoted to intellectual and moral virtues, it should be no surprise that is also has high standards for academic conduct.
